

ing an aperture therein through which the stamp on the inner envelop is exposed to view and canceled, and having directions printed thereon to remove the outer envelop and return the letter if not called for.

3. The combination of two envelops, one placed within the other, the outer envelop having an aperture therein for the uses and purposes herein set forth.

4. The combination of two envelops, one placed within the other, the outer envelop having the name and address of the person to whom it is to be sent written thereon, and having an aperture therein through which the stamp on the inner envelop is exposed to view and canceled; the inner envelop having a stamp thereon in such position that it is exposed to view and may be canceled through the aperture in the outer envelop, and having the name and address of the writer written on said inner envelop.

5. The combination of two envelops, one placed within the other, the outer envelop having the name and address of the person to whom it is to be sent written thereon, and having directions written thereon to remove the outer envelop and return the letter if not called for, and having an aperture therein through which the stamp on the inner envelop is exposed to view and canceled; the inner envelop having a stamp thereon in such position that it is exposed to view and can be canceled through the aperture in the outer envelop, and having the name and address of the writer written thereon.
